Cyclone Freddy Two Years On

On 11th March to 15th March 2023, the tropical Cyclone Freddy devastated Nsanje and most parts of the southern region of Malawi impacting over 2 million people. The relentless, heavy rains lasted for nearly five days, leading to severe flooding and tragically resulting in 11 casualties, with 15 individuals reported as missing and 12 injured. The cyclone wreaked havoc, destroying houses, leaving many homeless. Also, the fields, where crops such as maize were growing, were completely washed away with livestock suffering a similar fate.



Your generosity in response to this crisis enabled our four local partners in Malawi, AGLIT+, CARD, FACE and Eagles, to continue to walk alongside communities in the aftermath of Cyclone Freddy. This included the dredging of the riverbed and embankment to maintain the river's depth and flow and reduce flooding; the establishment of tree nurseries and community woods to provide a buffer to strong winds; obtaining drought-resilient crop seeds and training in climate resilient farming practices; the establishment of early warning systems; and the planting of bamboo and vetiver grasses which are fast growing and provide stability to soil as well as income generating opportunities.

The importance of a proactive approach

All We Can works through our local partners to build resilience to natural disasters through a methodology known as Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR). DRR seeks to ensure both the response to and recovery from natural disasters doesn't just return communities to pre-disaster levels of risk and vulnerability, but rather strengthens communities to withstand them better in the future. Climate change disproportionately affects our priority countries, and so planning for disasters is a crucial part of ensuring that the developmental gains of our partners are not lost.





The war in Ukraine

Your incredible generosity in response to the conflict in Ukraine has been able to provide a number of initiatives over the last three years, from winterisation kits so those displaced could cope with the freezing winters of Eastern Europe, through to the provision of 'summer camps' for Ukrainian refugee children. Your support also funded immediate relief items, such as food and hygiene products, as well as mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS), child safe spaces (CSS), support for the elderly, and integration into new countries and communities.



Myanmar Emergency Appeal

At about 1pm local time on Friday 28 March, a 7.7 magnitude earthquake struck Myanmar with the epicentre near Mandalay, the second largest city in the country. More than 3000 people are now reported to have died, with many hundreds still missing. People are without food, shelter and adequate sanitation, and we're appealing for your support to help meet the urgent need of people whose lives have been devastated by the earthquake.

All We Can shared the Methodist Church in Britain and the United Reformed Church's appeal to meet the humanitarian need resulting from the crisis in Gaza and Lebanon. Alongside this All We Can also launched our own appeal and, thanks to your generous support, partners in the region have been able to provide daily hot meals to families in the most severely affected areas, as well as rehabilitation support for injured children and an indoor play space to support the psychological wellbeing of children with disabilities.

Your support enabled one of our humanitarian aid partners to set up a satellite clinic in Gaza where they have been able to treat 415 children and hold 4,000 therapy sessions. Their main hospital in Jerusalem has had to suspend planned work to renovate its hydrotherapy pool after a grant secured through USAID was frozen. This hydrotherapy unit was a central part of the rehabilitation for young patients at the hospital and highlights the devastating impact that these aid cuts will have on individuals' lives.

But what about all the other people suffering from natural disasters and conflicts around the world?

It is often the case that not all emergencies make the news, which has a devastating impact on the communities All We Can serves. With multiple emergencies overseas at any one moment, some of the most marginalised communities are the ones who are often left behind. That's why we created the Emergency Relief Fund. A gift to the Emergency Relief Fund enables our partners to respond to crises, whenever it's needed, without delay.
